

# 70% of African population live in countries where governance has improved since 2006

The Ibrahim Index of African Governance (IIAG) provides an annual assessment of overall governance performance by measuring: Safety & Rule of Law, Participation & Human Rights, Sustainable Economic Opportunity and Human Development. Since 2006, 37 countries, hosting 70% of Africans, have improved in Overall Governance from 49.0 in 2006 to 50.0 in 2015. The greatest improvers over the decade are Côte d'Ivoire (+13.1), Togo (+9.7), Zimbabwe (+9.7), Liberia (+8.7) and Rwanda (+8.4).

In addition to overall governance improvement, service delivery of many public administrations across the continent have improved. The extent to which the government uses ICT to deliver public services at national level has shown improvement since 2006. Technological approaches have been used to enhance the efficiency and effectiveness of public services with the first African countries to launch successful digital strategies being Cabo Verde, Kenya, Morocco and Rwanda.
